Guidelines for Angora Paraders' Competitions

- The purpose of this competition is for the educating and encouraging the young Angora goat exhibitors to parade their exhibits before a Judge in an efficient manne.r
- Competitors to be 18 years and under.
- Competitors should display an ability to show and control their exhibits in an acceptable and efficient manner.
- Competitors should be encouraged to:
 - Walk into the Judging area and have complete control of the animal at all times
 - ♠ Change positions within a line-up upon request.
 - ♠ Move the animal around the ring at the judge's discretion
 - 1. Present a Normal judging view
 - 2. A Front view
 - 3. Line /side view
 - 4. Parading ability
- Parading Skills and Showmanship of the competitors is essential
- Move efficiently around the animal in the view of the judge at all times
- > Stand the animals in a presentational position at all times whilst in the view of the judge
- Competitors can be asked to answer simple questions relating to their paraded animals:
 - For instance, age, sex, shearing/crutching date type of fibre they are carrying, that is: kid, young goat, fine hair), when they last kidded, how do you tell the age of a goat e.g. teeth and other simple angora husbandry questions at the discretion of the ludge.
- Consideration should be given to having the animal in full view of the Judge (that is: Judge – animal – competitor) at all times.
- All Competitors should be suitably attired.
- > Condition of the animals although highly desirable, shall not be a deciding factor, except in the case of equality of the competitors.
- The size of the Judging arena should take into consideration the <u>safety</u> of <u>the competitors and their animals</u>, whilst at the same time allowing competitors to move around the judging arena without hindrance to other competitors.

Stewards/Judges for the events in such a situation may need to conduct heats.

- Heats will be determined on the number of entries
- A Ribbons should be presented to place getters in each heat, with

highly placed (e.g. first, second & third) competitors in such heats combining for a final.
