



Food for thought - Shearing training and students

West Wyalong High has been innovative in introducing students to the world of shearing and wool handling. An annual event which selected students thoroughly enjoy and many follow through and enter the industry. Plans are well underway to introduce a crutching and wigging school as a pre-cursor to what now exists on the school calendar.

Perhaps food for thought in trying to address the shearer shortage!?

The following article appeared in the School's Newsletter and is reprinted with permission.

SHEARING SCHOOL - Monday 6 November 2023

During Week 3, twelve students from West Wyalong High School attended a shearing school at Eveningside, Tallimba run by Australian Wool Innovations.

The twelve students who attended were Henry Burge, Hayden Collins, Flynn Bryant, Liam Gaynor, Dayne Lynch, Rowdy Thompson, Tim Haswell, Kade Wendt, Lewis Oxenbridge, Will Meacham, Charlie Dodds and Flynn Rees.

The students learnt how to shear by concentrating on one part of the shearing process at a time. They start by crutching the lambs to get a feel of the handpiece. The following steps include –

- 1. Bellies
- 2. First Back Leg
- 3. Going up the neck
- 4. Long blow
- 5. Finishing off the sheep

Once they have completed all steps they start shearing a full sheep.





During the week, the instructors emphasised the importance of hygiene, manners, healthy diet, sleep and staying hydrated.

The students also looked at the wool handling side of shearing and the importance of classing wool correctly. Grinding the combs and cutters was part of the shearing process. Like any organisation a shearing shed operates on teamwork to be successful.

Your patience and knowledge of the shearing industry was evident in what our students learnt in one week of shearing.

They realised the physicality of the job and the importance of correct technique to lower stress levels on the body.

John and Leanne Staniforth for again allowing us to use your shearing shed. It is an ideal shed for running a shearing school.

Grant and Rebecca Kitto for again providing the lambs. This is very much appreciated by the school and the students participating in this wonderful activity.

Moses and Sons and the West Wyalong Sheep Breeders Association for providing the students with shearing singlets. A big thank you to Troy Kelly at Regional Industry Education Partnerships for the funding and support of the shearing school. Australian Wool Innovations should be very proud of this program that they have developed. Giving school students an insight into the shearing and wool industry is fantastic.



AMMO Chairman's Report Jan 2024

Dear Producer.

As we enter 2024 I thought it appropriate to update producers on progress on AMMO's journey of improvement.

AMMO has been successful in selling a portion of the B2023 catalogue and I am currently working through the best way to sell the remainder of the catalogue as quickly as possible. All buyers' agents have had an opportunity to assess the catalogue and I have received very positive feedback on the presentation of the catalogue.

Plans for the classing and preparation for the A2024 sale, on Friday 24th May 2024, remain in place, with Luane' planning to commence classing on Monday 8th April. It has been suggested that we provide an opportunity for buyers to meet Luane' while she is in Narrandera.

Luane' has set new standards for productivity and consistency of lines and we hope that the preparation for the A2024 sale will improve further in the application of international classing standards to the AMMO catalogue. Feedback from buyers remains very positive.

AMMO prides itself in providing a transparent process for producers and buyers alike. A fundamental element of this process is the trust placed on the classer in preparing the catalogue – both by producers and buyers. The classing workshop aligns with AMMO's strategy of presenting consistent lines of a high technical standard in order to generate the best possible returns for producers. We will continue to strive for improvement in the presentation of the catalogue going forward.

A brief update on the AMMO calendar for the next six months is as follows:

- 1. Logistics of weaving group mohair into the Narrandera warehouse during the first three weeks of February 2024, followed by classing during the last week of February. It is important that all weaving group mohair is in the warehouse prior to Friday 23rd February.
- 2. AMMO lines will be coordinated for delivery into the warehouse during March in order that all mohair has been received prior to classing by Luane'.

The above arrangements will be coordinated by Graham Dau, with warehouse receivals arranged by Matt Shady.

AMMO sponsored a classing workshop for 17 participants on Friday 12th January, which was delivered by GT Ferreira. Nick Gorrie did a great job in making the arrangements. GT spent the morning presenting the overall context for classing. This was followed by an afternoon of hands-on application using fleeces provided by Nick.

The classing workshop was followed by an informal BBQ in Nicks shed. The participants of the classing workshop were able to view the animals in the sale catalogue.

The commencement of the Australian Mohair Industry Draught Resilience Implementation Plan has been postponed allowing producers to complete their kidding programs. I have a few more conversations with producers to complete before I can announce the final composition of participation. I spent some time during December discussing training delivery with nominated providers and plan to conclude these discussions during January.

In broad terms I am leading towards the following delivery structure for approximately 30 participants across three cohorts:

- 1. Northern cohort producers in the Toowoomba region of Queensland
- 2. Southern cohort NSW/SA/Vic producers
- 3. Online cohort those producers who may not be able to attend the Northern or Southern cohort training due to geographic location, or due to the fact that their properties are not sufficiently large to warrant Ecological Outcomes verification (EOV) but would do well with a simpler monitoring approach.

I am trying to co-fund workshops with local land care groups in order to obtain more value for money for the project overall and am in the process of setting out the project co-ordination team. Where possible we will hold workshops on mohair producer properties.

More on the above subjects are included in this newsletter.

The animals presented well, however overall this year it was a tough sale. Dulark put up 15 individually penned young bucks, plus a late entry of a 'pick of the pen' on a group of 5 bucks and 6 stud does. 2 bucks and 2 does sold. 2 at auction and 2 privately.

Lynndon Grove and Amarula studs presented 20 with 15 selling, 8 sold at auction and the rest were sold afterwards.

Top price doe was Lot 35 Lynndon Grove Zerlina 3391 which sold for \$1,175 to Susie Paterson, QLD. Tim & Marianne Ferguson attended in person and purchased the top price buck Lot 14 Lynndon Grove Zarif 3315.

Volume buyer of Lynndon Grove and Amarula stud bucks was Nick & Kate Gorrie purchasing Lot 9,10,11, 15 and 17 after the auction.

Unfortunately, due to the unexpected hot weather in the lead up Tagora and Kunkala had to turn around and couldn't attend the sale. This was a shame because there were buyers very interested in their stock.

Although we didn't sell as many as we hoped, it was a great opportunity to catch up with everyone in the industry at the start of the year.

Eggplant Chevon and Rice Casserole

INGREDIENTS

- · 2 lbs Eggplants
- · 1/2 lb Ground Goat lean
- · 2 tsp Olive Oil
- · 2 med, Onions Chopped
- · 1 large Red Bell Pepper (seeded and chopped)
- · 2 cloves Garlic -- minced
- 14 ½ oz Tomatoes, Canned -- undrained 2 tsp.
- · 2 tsp Oregano
- · ½ tsp. Thyme
- · 1/2 tsp. Ground Cinnamon
- · 1/4 tsp. Ground Cloves
- · 1 cup White Rice
- 14 ½ oz Beef Broth defatted or Vegetable Broth
- · 2 oz Feta Cheese -- crumbled
- · Salt And Pepper -- to taste

INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Cut eggplants in half lengthwise. Place eggplant halves, cut-side down, in a roasting pan. Add water to a depth of 1/2 inch. Bake until tender, 20 to 25 minutes; set aside. Reduce oven temperature to 400 degrees. While the eggplant is roasting, heat a large nonstick skillet over mediumhigh heat. Add ground lamb and saute, breaking up the meat with a wooden spoon, until browned, 3-5 minutes. Transfer to a colander and drain off fat. Set aside.



In a Dutch oven, heat oil over medium heat. Add onions and cook until golden, about 5 minutes. Add red peppers and garlic and cook for 2 minutes longer. Stir in tomatoes and their juice, oregano, thyme, cinnamon and cloves. Simmer slightly for 3 to 5 minutes, breaking up the tomatoes with a wooden spoon, until the mixture has thickened slightly. Scoop out eggplant flesh and chop coarsely.

Stir rice, beef broth, chopped eggplant and the reserved lamb into the tomato mixture; bring to a simmer. Cover the pan and place it in the oven. Bake for 30 to 35 minutes, or until the rice is tender and the liquid has been absorbed. Season with salt and pepper. Dot with feta and serve.
