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Editor's Notes

UNPRECEDENTED TIMES! Who would have thought the World would be in such a mess in 2020. While drought, bushfires, and flood are not unusual environmental challenges here in Australia, they pale into insignificance compared to the havoc Covid-19 is causing across the entire world, to human lives and the global economy.

A number of earlier Shows on the east coast were cancelled due to bushfires in January however we were fortunate to get four Shows in before LOCKDOWN. The results for the Diamond Fibre, Berwick & Goulburn Shows, plus NATS are included in this issue.

The LOCKDOWN, for which we have no definite end date, has resulted in the cancellation of everything until further notice. The "What's On" section has been omitted from the Newsletter until this crisis is over.

The rules around social distancing & gatherings of people is also impacting our livestock industries. You can keep up to date on these changes on the web. Meat and Livestock, Animal Health Australia, NSW DPI all have current information relating to the news rules & regulations now in place for dealing with stopping the spread of Covid-19.

One of the ramifications of these national lockdowns is also the impact it is having on the movement of wool & mohair overseas. Wool prices here are on the decline as China is the main imported and processor of our wool.

As most of our mohair goes to South Africa, it's worth noting the South African went into total lockdown from 26th March to 16th April. This lockdown has now been extended from 1st May for an indefinite period. Wool and Mohair sales are to recommence from May 19th.

Shearing is considered an Essential Service, however there are now rules applying to the workplace which shearers & shed hands must abide by. Some members will have received a copy of these rules via email. If you didn't get the info, you can find it on the NSW DPI website.

On the subject of shearing, there seems to be a shortage of people willing to shear goats. The List of Shearers which usually on the last page of the Newsletter has deliberately been omitted from this issue as it urgently needs updating. If you have a shearer who is willing to shear goats, could you please share their contact details for inclusion in the next Newsletter.

That's it, a bit longer than anticipated. Stay Home, Keep Safe

National President Report

Hello all, since our last communication the world is changing however farmers are in a pretty good position. Rain is more widespread. I have had more rain this year than the last 2 years! Agriculture production is classed as an essential industry under the COVID 19 government regulations so we can continue working within our businesses. In recent times mohair prices seem to be particularly good and clearances are excellent however I think we are moving into a time with more uncertainty and we need to prepare ourselves for changes in the international market demand and price for the luxury fashion fibre mohair.

With the COVID 19 situation we need to ensure we comply to the government regulations. In particular non-essential travel should be cancelled, group meetings (i.e. regions or divisions) and face to face meetings should be changed and done remotely by phone, internet video conferencing or email, and any major events should be postponed.

We were lucky to get NATS in before the COVID-19 government regulations changes occurred. I think on reflection it was a very successful event and it is reported separately. We must all remember (including me) that Goat shows are only one part of the mix we must put together to grow the industry. Just like Price is only one part of the Marketing Mix (Price, Product, Position and Place). We cannot rely on them to grow the industry nor measure the success of a show on how many new growers we get. There is no doubt we need to do more to hear the commercial voice and complete the commercial package to better sell our industry.

The board has put in place an approval process on expenditure with regions and divisions. This is not to take the activities away from regions or divisions but to put in place a procedure (common set of rules) which we all follow and where approval from the board must be obtained before spending large amounts of money (\$250 for regions and \$750 for divisions). All companies I have worked for have procedures like this in place which helps clarify expectations and works well if you plan out your activities. In deciding to spend money, it is important to consider the return on investment. The criteria for Return On Investment (ROI) should include the following:

- · How is this investment going to grow the industry membership, and
- · How is this investment going to increase the profile of mohair production in Australia, and
- · How is this investment going to assist in attracting producers into the industry.

In assessing ROI, some things may need to be altered or changed so we have more money for key activities that can help the total industry.

Peter Schuster has included an update on the Goat fibre sustainability project, and this is included in the newsletter. In parallel we are also planning to follow up our discussions with Agrifutures about building a project case for industry development.

Grant Forsdick is heading up the website update and refresh project. We have had a very disrupted start to the year with bushfires, floods and COVID 19 however we have been working in the background and we should see some positive changes completed in the coming weeks.

Our breeder and grower discussions have been delayed however NATS proved to be a good opportunity for board members to interact with members and the industry.

On a lighter note Kate has been practicing for a 30 km walk with her sisters called Sydney Coast-trek (which has now been postponed due to COVID-19) and has been looking for the best socks for long distance walking and running. Guess what is the top recommendation from the professionals! Jogging Socks made by Balega Yarns and Technology that are all blended with mohair. 

AMMO A2020 sale

Independent report on the AMMO A2020 sale held on Friday 6th March.

AMMO presented some 24,200 kg of mohair in 39 lots (134bales). Three mills were represented with two buyers operating for Stuckens, Sudwalle and AMT (presumably SAMIL).

Bidding was energetic with prices reported to be similar to the South African sale held earlier in the week. A complete clearance was achieved after negotiations on 7 lots.

The quality of the offering was considered very good with most lots edging on the longer edge of the coded descriptions. The mohair again reflected the finer trend of Australian mohair in recent offerings. Again, the quantity of very short mohair was of concern.

A complete summary of test results and prices is attached. Prices were again strong with a 25.2um lot of 272kg of BSFK reaching \$48.15/kg greasy, 139kg of BSK (28.5um) bringing \$42.60, a 207kg lot of BSFFYG (29.3um) bringing \$35.00, a 226kg bale of BFYG bringing \$30.10, an 11 bale lot of CFH (32.4um) bringing \$24.20 and a 5 bale lot of CFH (34.7um) bringing \$20.00. Outsorts generally sold well with CXFH (kempy adult) bringing \$12.80, 8 bales of SCOT \$24.95 and STN (light stains) \$20.30.

Some concern is expressed at the size of the offering given that no sale was held in November 2019. Prices for mohair would seem conducive to increased production but it is recognised that drought and high meat prices present potential growers with impediments to increasing stock numbers. Not to mention the time required to grow numbers by normal reproductive means.

Our Story: The Journey to Currajong Common



— Angora Goat Farm —

Introduction and Background

Grant and Jenny Forsdick together with our two daughters Megan and Lara relocated from South Africa to Sydney during July 1999. We had been living in the historic town of Stellenbosch which provided us with a country lifestyle, within easy commute to Cape Town and the wonderful beaches of the Cape Peninsula.

Grant's family fruit farm was acquired by the South African Government in 1986, the year we were married. This was a very traumatic period for our family and ever since it has been our dream to set up a country lifestyle. This is a difficult process in a new country! We had to first re-established our careers in Sydney and then after Megan and Lara had left home, we were finally able to commence the search for a property. We had a long list of selection criteria; close to the sea, mountains, river, regional airport and the opportunity to develop the property further. It took five years until we eventually came across Currajong Common and after a lengthy negotiation, finally took ownership in July 2017.

We immediately saw the opportunity when we visited Currajong Common for the first time. Biodiversity of native species, hand built mud brick character home and excellent fit to our property selection criteria made the property ideal for our desired future lifestyle.

During the first year we renovated the homestead, modernizing but retaining the unique character of the home, upgraded the solar energy system that provided electricity and hot water, and replaced the diesel powered water pump with a solar powered pump. The diesel powered mono pump has been converted into a backup portable pumping solution.

The shearing shed and yards have been expanded and redesigned to better cater for an increase in animal numbers and the stone kidding shed has been converted into the 'Stone Cottage' for guest accommodation.

Why Angoras?

Very simple – they came with the property. We had not made a decision on an enterprise before we were presented with the Angora opportunity. What could we lose? Give it a go for a year and review after that.

It did not take long for us to fall in love with the animals; they are smart, have a wonderful temperament and we saw the opportunity to develop a high quality commercial mohair operation.

The first year's strategy was to understand the key ingredients required to produce high quality mohair, including the commercial aspects of running a mob. Our first hurdle was to overcome an intestinal worm challenge. We commenced with regular FEC and a strict drenching regime, in close consultation with our vet. This remains a key and fundamental aspect of our farming strategy.

We immediately started to apply regenerative farming principles with the aim of increasing the carrying capacity of the property. My simple interpretation of this strategy was that we are actually grass farmers, and healthy soils produce nutritionally dense plant matter, which in turn produces a healthy animal, and a healthy animal has the potential to produce high quality mohair.

We understood the challenge of generating a retirement income from a 100 acre property, so optimizing returns and minimizing input costs were key commercial elements of our strategy. We added natural methods to reduce worm burden through rotational grazing – short intensive grazing periods, followed by long recovery periods. Not only did this provide the grass time to recover, but it also made a positive impact on worm burden by naturally breaking the worm cycle.

We divided the farm into 20 paddocks of approximately five acres each, and applied a rigorous rotational grazing strategy. This provided us with the additional grass required to increase the size of the mob. Over two years we were able to grow the mob to 400 animals....until the recent drought required a reduction of 100 animals.

During our second year we acquired a stud buck as a key initiative to improve the quality of mohair. This was an excellent investment as our average price of the clip increase by over 25% for our second year clip.

The past year has been focused on improving nutrition and animal health, and Ross Waller did an excellent job in formulating a dry lick to suit our environment. There is a noticeable difference in size of the kids from the 2019 drop compared to previous years, and the results of the first clip will tell the story of improved mohair quality!

The Future?

On the farming front our next initiative will be the establishment of a suitable cover crop to further increase the carrying capacity, increase the nutritional value of pastures and further reduce our use of drenches for intestinal worm management. We will also be fine tuning farming infrastructure to make farming easier.



Our next challenge on our journey is to combine the mohair enterprise with a tourism enterprise to generate multiple streams of income. The Sapphire Coast is being developed into a tourist destination and we are in a prime position to benefit from these developments provided we develop appropriate and unique products.

During 2019, we developed and tested two tourism products; one for local day trips and the other to target the growing cruise ship industry. Feedback has been extremely positive on the inclusion of shearing shed tour, 'meet the goats' and a discussion of the mohair value chain, regenerative farming practices and farming angora goats.

We are extremely proud of our latest enterprise which is the establishment of a glamping retreat 'Currajong Retreat'. This will be a signature retreat, catering for couples looking for 'emersion in nature', 'agri-tourism', 'unconnected escapes' combined with absolute luxury. We are more than half way through this development and hope to launch by the end of March 2020. The recent fire emergency, floods and COVID-19 caused significant delays to the construction phase of this development. It is hoped to be able to launch this product as soon as travel restrictions are lifted.

This development is proudly supported by the NSW government's tourism and major events agency Destination NSW, through the 2019 – 2020 Regional Tourism Fund.

In summary, we have embarked on a very exciting journey of establishing combined enterprises of premium quality mohair and tourism, which we believe will provide a comfortable and secure lifestyle for our family for generations to come.

Grant will continue with his involvement in the advisory business 'Polaris and Partners', based primarily in Sydney.

We are excited about the prospects of growing our mohair enterprise and it is with this positive sentiment that I agreed to the nomination to the board of Mohair Australia. Nick Gorrie and myself have an active strategy to meet mohair growers and listen to their ideas regarding the future of the industry. It is clear from input to date that a growing industry will benefit all members, and for this to materialize there will need to be significant promotion of the industry, and in particular demonstrating the commercial benefits for new entrants. I personally have generated interest from three potential farmers to date. I am, however, genuinely concerned about the current industry fragmentation, and fear that this will possibly be the biggest factor that will weigh against attracting new entrants.

Goat Fibre Sustainability Project - update

The AgriFutures Goat Fibre Program aims to direct targeted research, development and extension (RD&E) which contributes to the profitability, sustainability and productivity of the goat fibre industry. The need for the goat fibre production sector to be able to demonstrate its sustainability credentials and to promote production systems which meet domestic and international expectations was identified as a priority.

In November 2019, AgriFutures engaged Schuster Consulting Group (SCG) to develop Goat Fibre Sustainability Guidelines and a Production Manual for use by the fibre goat industry. These resources are to be developed such that they may at some stage in the future form the basis of an auditable quality management system, although this is beyond the scope of the current research. The fibre production guidelines will be based on best practice and existing legislative requirements. The production manual will support the adoption and implementation of the guidelines on farm.

An industry meeting was held on 8th November 2019 to commence the project. This included the formation of an industry reference group and the identification of key stakeholders who will be consulted throughout the development process. This group includes representatives of the mohair and cashmere production sectors as wellas buyers and processors.

Since this meeting, SCG has conducted a global scan of relevant programs, resources and legislation. Importantly, this has included the international Responsible Mohair Standard which is currently under development. The international standard is sufficiently progressed (and publicly available) to ensure duplication is avoided and complementarity is optimised. The draft has been reviewed and the Goat Fibre Production and Production Manual will be developed to help the Australian industry demonstrate conformance with this international standard when it is delivered later in 2020.

The next phase of the research which has just commenced involves industry consultation to ensure all aspects of the production supply chain are considered in the guidelines and manual.

The guidelines and the manual are scheduled to be delivered in June 2020. While current travel and meeting restrictions will disrupt consultation and delivery, the project team remains committed to delivering within the agreed timeframe.

Promotional Grant

A grant of \$100 can be applied for by Regions & Divisions, to assist with the cost of promotional events such as Field Days, etc. This event should be promoting Mohair Australia Ltd, and Angora Goats and Mohair within Australia.

To qualify for the grant the event must be pre-advertised in the Mohair Newsletter, and a report with a photo must be submitted to the Mohair Newsletter Editor. The application form is on the website under the "forms" section.

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GICA Report

Mohair Australia Ltd applied and was accepted as a voting member of GICA. Sue Jordan is our delegate and Nick Gorrie is alternative delegate.

The Goat Industry Council of Australia (GICA) is the peak national body representing the interests of goat producers. GICA's objective and purpose is to represent and promote the national interests of Australian goatmeat, fibre and dairy producers. GICA is a designated Commodity Council of the Federation, and works with government, industry bodies, producers and other peak industry councils to develop goat industry policy for all breeds of goats. GICA is responsible for the distribution of income received through the goat transaction levy (37.7 cents per head).

The current division of this levy to relevant levy funded organisations is as follows:

- Meat and Livestock Australia (MLA) marketing: 10.5 cents
- MLA research and development: 16.7 cents (which is matched with Australian Federal Government funds)
- · Animal Health Australia (AHA): 4.5 cents
- · National Residue Survey (NRS): 6 cents

A goat fibre levy is also collected and is matched by federal funding and provides Agrifutures with funding to promote fibre research.

The 2019 AGM and Council Meeting was help in Adelaide at the end of November. The meeting was attended by representatives from the state farmers organisation (NSW, Victoria, Queensland and South Australia} as well as representatives of the commodity organizations namely the dairy goat, fibre and rangeland goats.

Along with reports and policy matters the meeting was attended by representative from the four organisations to whom the goat levy gets paid.

Some of the points raised/discussed -

MLA – Des Rinehart and Emily Litzow

Des introduced Emily who will be replacing Julia Petty while she is on secondment within MLA.

Emily will be developing a Goat Disease Handbook funded by FMD Ready (SA).

Levy update – MLA are expecting similar numbers for 2020 – although the drought might have a greater bearing on goat slaughter.

Research and development

Numerous projects are being undertaken – those of that might interest angora/mohair producers include -

- goat production conditions AHA is continuing work on developing a multi-disease assurance program (FMD, CAE and JD) for goats through GoatMAP review working group. Next meeting 10th December 2019.
- NLIS The NLIS Business Rules for sheep and goats are being translated into Sheep and Goat Standards.
- Pain relief husbandry practices.
- Development of a GICA Welfare Policy/Statement for Goats

NRS – David Papdula

DP provided the Council with an overview of NRS activities and monitoring in relation to the goat industry. This included testing and monitoring of goats through the meat works, LPA auditing, residue testing. Milk contaminants and fibre testing seems to be lacking.

The meeting also spent time discussion such things as the GICA website, strategic plan, policies, communication and an induction program for new members (including deputies). One thing I had trouble getting my head around were the number of acronyms used (thought we were bad enough in the medical scene!).

Since the face to face meeting we have had a teleconference relating to 'tagging' and a reminder that there are changes to the NVD coming!

GOULBURN SHOW – 7 MARCH 2020

ANGORA GOATS

This year Goulburn was the only Angora goat show in the NSW Eastern Region to survive the fires with Albion Park and Berry cancelled and Camden subsequently succumbing to the virus.

It is good to have a Show in a substantial building with the pens already set up and a spacious show ring and good access.

Four exhibitors presented 28 fleeces and 32 animals for judging. Rowan Ross exhibiting as his new Rosa stud for the first time.

The fleece classes were evenly supported with 5-6 entries in each class, only one fleece being moved by the Judge from Young Goat to Kid. Windy Reefs dominated this section winning four out of the five classes and Champion Fleece from the First Shear class. Reserve Champion was the Winder fleece in the same class.

Buck kid classes were competitive with Rosa dominating the under 6 months class, but the older classes were less well supported. Both Champion and Reserve Buck came from 12-24 months with Impact Nathan and Winder Paragon.

Doe kid classes were strong with Ruby Rosa (6-12m) taking Champion Kid ahead of Winder Radar (6-12m buck). The strongest class of the day was the 12-24 does won by Impact Midora ahead of Windy Reefs. Interestingly they didn't feature in the Champion line up as Impact Georgia (24-36m) and Impact Dorothea (24m +) were Champion and Reserve.

Supreme Champion was Impact Nathan (yearling buck)
