She not only attended shows but was a great and appreciated Sponsor. She was actively involved with the South East Region of NSW Division. She organized & booked the Christmas Party each year at a great South Coast restaurant. She was always encouraging and supportive of newcomers to the Industry.

She opened her beloved 'Currajong Common' and that amazing mud brick home they had built together, for Field Days and other informative meetings, and many an 'extended' meeting were enjoyed by participants!

Gay loved Australia. Together with Ron they travelled extensively to remote parts of the Australian outback. She cherished her little piece of paradise, a partially cleared property, bounded by bushland and the Towamba River, in the locality of Burragate. ### **National Presidents Letter**

### June 2021

Welcome to the start of winter and some pretty cold mornings down our way.

Whilst it seems as though not a lot has happened in the past 12 months, to some members it has been a busy year on the agri-politics side of the industry. I can report we appear to be getting somewhere as an industry with Agrifutures. Once the new RD&E plan for Goat fibre is endorsed by the Agrifutures board in September we will have something to show for the hard work.

The international textile market has still a strong appetite for mohair. As reported internationally demand is up and supply is low. In Australia the total annual production of mohair is approximately 80,000 - 85,000 kg per year, however the last industry survey was undertaken in 2004 and we have given a new commitment to Agrifutures to get an updated survey done of angora numbers, kgs produced, sentiment and region (like postcode). Many current producers entered the industry in the early 80's and are of a similar age bracket. With record farm property prices it makes sense some people will exit and retire or leave for other family reasons. Our challenge for the entire industry is to find new producers. Our focus must be on reinvigorating the industry and growing it commercially.

There is some work that must be done between now and the AGM for the current board. We have set the AGM date as Thursday the 25th November 2021 to be held in the Canberra region. We are pleased to let you know that AMMO has indicated that they will host their AGM on the same day and at the same venue. Venue & further details to be confirmed closer to the date.

It is an election year and relevant nomination notices are listed in this newsletter. On the national board side we will declare all positions open and call for nominations to serve on the executive board. Having the right people involved is important.

Over the coming 10-12 weeks our attention will turn to kidding on our farm. In the lead up it is important to remind ourselves to keep up the animal husbandry required which includes drenching twice with potassium iodine. All your efforts will be rewarded!





### Financial confidence underpins industry

Record prices & improved seasonal conditions throughout most of the country underpinned the much higher confidence in the financial future for livestock producers.






However, it should be noted that **QLD producers were slightly less confident** (+16) than producers in Victoria & NSW (+22). This is **primarily reflective of the patchy seasonal conditions** throughout Queensland at the time of the survey.

Interestingly, the younger producers (20s & 30s) were slightly less confident in their financial future – a result linked strongly to the very high land prices and cost of entry into the industry.



# Livestock producers more positive about Australia's future



Given the **current season & market conditions**, it is not surprising that Australian livestock producers are feeling more positive about Australia's future than the rest of the nation.

From the livestock producers surveyed, it was the respondents in **their 40s (80%)** who were the most positive about the direction of the country. In contrast, it was the oldest age demographic, 70s+ who were the least positive, with only 46% positive about the direction of the country. The reduced optimism of the oldest age group is likely to be influenced by the "**experience, wisdom & caution**" of this age group & their experiences over several decades.

### An exciting time to be in farming with global opportunity

Producers across the sector are genuinely excited by the opportunities in farming with great global opportunities for Australian agricultural products.

Despite potential setbacks with wide-spread supply chain disruptions and market access restrictions throughout 2020, producers remain optimistic that despite the setbacks, the sector was able to push on with favourable seasonal conditions and achieve record prices.

When asked at Beef Australia in Rockhampton in early May 2021, "Is this as good as it gets?"






# Absence of leadership is holding back the industry


Approximately one in two producers see there is an absence in real leadership in the industry. Hampering progress is the sense of an inability to influence real change, as government 'holds the power to control how the industry is run'.

in the products and workplace."

"Who fights for Agriculture as an industry...we are fragmented through each production option"







# What's keeping producers up at night?

Beyond the weather and livestock prices, livestock producers have a wide range of concerns. Predominant concerns surround global markets regulation and the environment.

Concerns around "social license" were raised by several respondents. This was largely in relation to the social attitude towards farming & the perception that agriculture was being neglected by the government, in preference to minority anti-farming groups.




Producers are very aware of the importance of access and competitiveness in global markets. In this section, unplanned & larger economic issues were raised as the main concern for businesses - including recent China trade issues, uncompetitive market access conditions and slowing global demand (this was likely top of mind given the Covid-19 impacts in 2020-21).

Environment concerns were very diverse – reflecting the range and challenges across Australia. Excluding weather & drought, the main responses centred around:

- Water access
- Climate change & policy
- Land clearing regulations

### Concern on social, economic & regulatory pressures



Producers in the expansion/growth stage of their business were likely to be **more concerned with land prices** than producers in other categories. When asked directly what their main business concern was, **the top 6 answers only accounted for 34% of answers**, showing the diversity in business challenges facing producers.

### The top answers were:

- More government support for all farmers, with reference to those entering the industry
- Better access to markets / free trade agreements
- Better promotion of the sector to the broader public

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### Producers are more closely evaluating risk to manage return

With a desire to 'feel in control' producers are adapting to how they manage risk within their individual businesses.

### Less can be more

Of particular interest is that 70% of producers are actively pursuing practices to reduce their carbon footprint of their operations.

Partnering the perceived lack of industry leadership, **more than 30% of producers are struggling to know where to invest their time and effort** in order to maximise their returns. The opportunity to empower producers and foster capability development, particularly around decision making exists.

### Reputation and misrepresentation present challenges

Approximately three-quarters of producers view that they are misrepresented in the mass media, these concerns spill over into producers feeling an overwhelming concern as to the reputation of the sector within the broader community.

# Industry representation concerning producers


Despite significant investment at both national and localised levels, the effort vs reward in supporting producers and empowering and shifting the narrative of agriculture with the broader community is not seeing the flow through impacts for producers.

Almost 4 out of 5 agreeing that they are misrepresented in the mass media, the following questions could be investigated:

- 1) What is being misrepresented?
- 2) How would you like to be represented?
- 3) What are the key exposure points that need to be addressed?



### **AMMO Market Report**

AMMO's first Auction for 2021 saw very spirited bidding for the 16,822 kg on offer with a sale average of \$30.05. Prices increased because of very strong demand and low levels of supply. A new Australian buyer in the market improved competition.

The sale average was \$5.30 above the previous best AMMO average. Record prices were received for young goat and fine adult.

### Top prices:

KID \$60.40, FF Young Goat \$50.00 and FF Hair \$35.60

The Knitwear section is currently experiencing very strong demand which is a major reason for the very high price levels.





### HERBED OKRA, CHEVON (GOAT MEAT) AND TOMATO STEW



### **DETAILS**

### **Ingredients**

11/2 lb (approx 680 grams) fresh okra - cleaned, uncut 2 lb (907 grams) tomatoes - rough dice 1/2 lb (approx 226.8 grams) chevon - breast cut, cubed 3 tbsp (60 mls) extra virgin olive oil 2 tbsp (30 grams) garlic - fine chop 1/4 cup (125 ml) lemon juice - fresh 1/4 cup (125 ml) water 2 tsp sea salt 1tsp freshly ground pepper Jalapeno relish (optional)

### Method

This stew was such a breeze to make. Cut the meat in bite size cubes, sprinkle with salt and pepper and set aside. To prepare the okra, wash the pods, drain them, remove the cap at an angle as in the picture as to not puncture the capsule (to avoid the slimey-ness) and set aside. Finely chop the garlic cloves, and roughly chop the tomatoes.

In a large heavy pot, over medium heat, drizzle the olive oil and saute the chevon for 3 minutes, add okra and saute for 3 minutes while stiring occasionally. Add tomatoes, water, half of the cilantro, salt and pepper. Stir together and cover pot. Reduce heat to simmer for 30 minutes. Adjust seasoning, add lemon juice and serve hot. Rice makes a good side.
